(One of the main cities of the Upper Silesian coal and industrial basin. 65 km WNW of Cracow and 12km E of Katowice, its Provincial Capital, it had 260,000 inhabitants in 1990).

Before World I Sosnowiec was just inside Russian Poland, almost right on the "Three Emperiums" point with the German and the Austrian-Hungarian Empires. Occupied by the Germans, the use of Municipal stamps (1st Issue) was forbidden by the Germans as soon as they heard of their issue. After that, however, upon the urgent request by the first Mayor appointed by them, and his explanation that this would cause much harm to the municipal treasury, it was exceptionally permitted by them until the end of June, 1916.

By order of the new German occupiers only cancellation marks with value indication were allowed. The municipal authorities circumvented the bam on value-bearing stamps by having letters for which a 3 kopecks delivery fee had to be paid in advance, by using stamps in the form of so-called triangular "sealing labels", which were them stamped over with a 3 kop. "receipt cancellation".

Ink pads with violet, blue, and black ink were used (see next page).

Re. the City's name "Sosnowice" on these stamps ("sealing labels"): The City's proper name was, and is, Sosnowice, not "Sosnowice". The Germans, however, called it "Sosnowitz". It is said that the spelling "Sosnowice" was chosen to pay lip-service to German sensitivities!

The late Prof. Stanisław Mikstein of Cracow was perhaps the earliest of Polish stamps' great experts. Witold Mikulski, of Kielce, was another. Eugeniusz Krawczyk, of Warsaw, is one of the present officially recognized experts of the PZF (Polish Philatelic Union). The stamps on this page have also been declared absolutely genuine by Krzysztof Ceremuga, of Mt.Isa, Qld., Australia.


